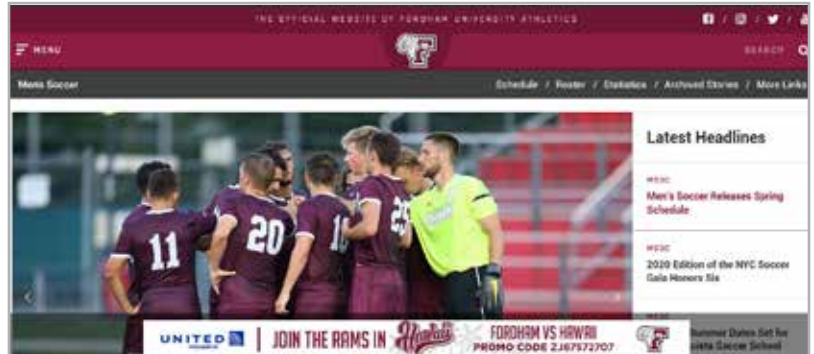

Directions to Fordham/Jack Coffey Field

From Upstate NY and Rockland County: NY State Thruway South to the Tappan Zee Bridge. Take Exit 8 onto Rt. 287 (Cross-Westchester Expressway). Take Exit 3 onto the Sprain Brook Parkway South (to NYC). Sprain Brook Parkway turns into the Bronx River Parkway. Take Exit 7W / Fordham Rd. (US 1). Proceed west for approximately 1/4 mile. The New York Botanical Garden will be on your right. Stay to the right, avoiding the underpass. At the light, turn right onto Southern Blvd / Dr. Theodore Kazimiroff Blvd. After 1/4 mile, turn left into the University.

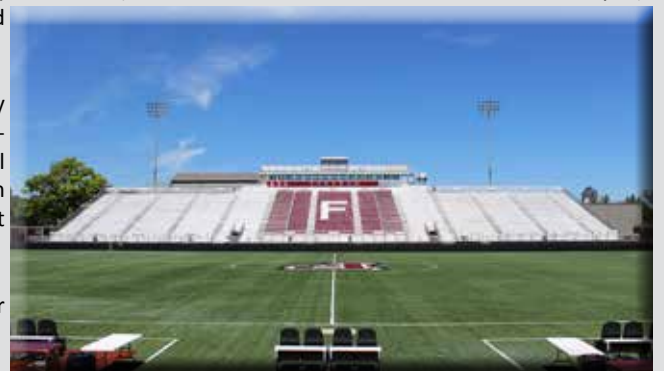
From New England: Via Rt. 84: Follow Rt. 84 West to Brewster, NY. Exit to 684 South. 684 changes to the Hutchinson River Parkway South. Exit to Pelham Parkway West. Pass the exits to the Bronx River Parkway (the New York Botanical Garden will be on your right), and stay to the right, avoiding the underpass. At the light, turn right onto Southern Blvd / Dr. Theodore Kazimiroff Blvd. After 1/4 mile, turn left at the light into the University.

From New England: Via I-95: Follow I-95 South to Exit 8C/Pelham Parkway West. Pass the exits to the Bronx River Parkway (the New York Botanical Garden will be on your right), and stay to the right, avoiding the underpass. At the light, turn right onto Southern Blvd. / Dr. Theodore Kazimiroff Blvd. After 1/4 mile, turn left at the light into the University.

From the George Washington Bridge: Off the bridge, take the exit for the Henry Hudson Parkway North (1st exit from the Bridge). Follow the Henry Hudson Pkwy North to Exit 24, Mosholu Parkway. Stay on the Mosholu Parkway to the end (the New York Botanical Garden will be in front of you). Take a right onto Southern Boulevard. Fordham's main entrance is at the third light. Turn right into campus.

From Long Island: Take the Whitestone Bridge to the Hutchinson River Parkway North. Exit at Pelham Parkway West. Follow Pelham Parkway West for approximately 2 miles. Pass the exits to the Bronx River Parkway (Botanical Garden will be on your right), and stay to the right, avoiding the underpass. At the light, turn right onto Southern Blvd / Dr. Theodore Kazimiroff Blvd. After 1/4 mile, turn left into the University.

Directions to Jack Coffey Field: As you enter campus, parking garage is on your left. Go up the main drive on the right to the Jack Coffey Field stands.

Carlo Acquista, a New York Red Bulls scout and former head coach at Adelphi University and St. Francis College, was named the fifth head coach of the Fordham men's soccer program on January 30, 2019 by Fordham director of athletics Dave Roach.

"We are thrilled to bring on Carlo Acquista to lead the men's soccer program," said Roach. "Carlo has extensive background in finding outstanding talent and bringing it to New York, whether it was for the Red Bulls, Adelphi, or St. Francis, and then develop that talent into winning programs. We hope he will continue that trend at Fordham and keep our program at the top of the Atlantic 10 Conference."

"I am humbled and honored for this fantastic opportunity that has been presented to me here at Fordham University. My family and I could not be more thrilled to become part of the Rams family. I want to thank David Roach, Charlie Elwood, and the committee for their belief and trust I will continue with men's soccer traditions," said Acquista. "As a native New Yorker, I understand the history of Fordham University and the men's soccer program. I am looking forward to continue instilling the core values of



integrating academic and athletic experiences successfully in the Jesuit tradition. I will work diligently to recruit the talented student-athlete who will compete in the ultra-competitive Atlantic 10, as well as meeting and engaging our proud alumni, campus community, and fans."

Acquista comes to Rose Hill after serving as a New York Red Bulls scout since February 2018, assisting in the construction of the MLS roster, and serving as lead scout and recruiter for the USL and PDL rosters. He observed and evaluated college and professional matches globally, providing detailed reports to the New York Red Bulls Sporting Director, Head Scout, and Head Coach.

Prior to his stint with the Red Bulls, Acquista spent 11 seasons as the head men's soccer coach at Adelphi University, as well as serving as a Senior Assistant Athletic Director in the Adelphi athletics department.

Acquista posted a 120-69-19 record with the Panthers, good for a .623 winning percentage. He led the Panthers to four league championships in his tenure, which included two in the Atlantic Soccer Conference (2009 and 2010) and, more recently, two Northeast-10 Conference Championships (2016 and 2017), earning Northeast-10 and ECAC Coach of the Year honors in both of those seasons.

After making its first NCAA appearance in nine seasons in 2015, Adelphi went 19-1-2 in 2016, winning the NCAA Division II East Region and advancing to the NCAA Championship quarterfinals, setting school records for wins and shutouts (13) and finishing the year ranked fifth in the United Soccer Coaches national poll. Acquista was named the 2016 United Soccer Coaches East Region Coach of the Year at the end of the year, as Adelphi finished with a #5 national ranking.

In Acquista's first six years at the helm, he oversaw the final Division I seasons for the team in the Atlantic Soccer Conference (ASC) and as an independent. In that time, the squad claimed two ASC Tournament titles (2009 and 2010) while reaching the playoffs all five years. Acquista was honored as the ASC Coach of the Year three times, in 2008, 2009 and 2011.

In his Adelphi career, Acquista coached over four dozen All-Conference players across Division I and Division II, two dozen All-Region honorees and nearly a dozen All-Americans across the NSCAA, United Soccer Coaches' Association and Division II Conference Commissioner's Association (D2CCA) ranks. He also developed half a dozen players that reached the professional ranks over the USL, NASL, MLS, and Europe.

Acquista arrived at Adelphi from St. Francis College (NY), where he held the position of head coach for five seasons and was one of the youngest Division I coaches in the country (23-years-old), when he was hired in 2002.

In addition to his college coaching, Acquista has been a part of One Goal Sport, serving as owner and director of soccer and coaching education. He has been a U.S. Soccer Coaching Education instructor, a Region I ODP coach and player evaluator, and holds a USSF "A" Coaching License.

A graduate of St. John's University in 2000, Acquista was a four-year member of the Red Storm men's soccer team, which reached the NCAA tournament in each of his four seasons. He helped St. John's capture an NCAA Division I national title in 1996 and also had a hand in two Big East Championship teams. He has a degree in sports management from St. John's and later graduated from Adelphi University with a master's degree in sports management.

Acquista and his wife, Lauren, reside in Westbury, N.Y., and have twin boys, Lucas and Christian.

In his first season on the Fordham men's soccer staff is assistant coach Philip Bannister.

Bannister is very familiar with Fordham head coach Carlo Acquista having been on his coaching staff at Adelphi University. Bannister spent two seasons with the Panthers and was a part of the 2017 East Region Coaching Staff of the Year after Adelphi won the Northeast-10 regular season championship and finished with a #14 national ranking. In 2018, the Panthers once again claimed the NE-10 regular season championship, while also winning the tournament championship.

Prior to Adelphi, Bannister spent three years at St. John's University. He served his first two years as a graduate assistant with the Red Storm before



transitioning to the position of volunteer assistant and joined St. John's after one season as a graduate assistant with the women's soccer team at Bloomsburg.

Following a standout collegiate career at Loyola (Md.), the Wallsend, England native was drafted by the Colorado Rapids in the 2011 MLS Supplemental Draft. Bannister went on to play for the DC United U-23 team before returning home to England to play semi-professionally for Blyth Spartans AFC.

A four-time All-MAAC selection, Bannister was a two-time first team choice and a two-time second team honoree. As a freshman, the forward earned MAAC Rookie of the Year honors and led all Division I freshmen in scoring after totaling 13 goals and seven assists. Bannister finished his career ranked eighth in program-history in goals (40), a mark that included 13 game-winners, tied for first in assists (29) and sixth in points (109).

A Lowe's Senior CLASS Award Finalist as a senior, Bannister was a

two-time ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America selection. Bannister, who owns FA Level 1 and FA Level 2 coaching badges, graduated from Loyola in 2011 with a degree in marketing and earned an MBA in finance from St. John's.

Stephen Georgio was named assistant strength and conditioning coach at Fordham in August of 2019.

Georgio will be charged with the design, implementation, and evaluation of sport-specific speed, strength, and conditioning for varsity teams as well as analyzing nutritional habits or student-athletes and educating them on healthy dietary choices. He will also be responsible for computer data entry of strength, speed, and conditioning test results, and athlete nutritional analyses.

Georgio served as a volunteer strength and conditioning coach for the Rams in the summer of 2019, working with the football and men's and women's basketball programs.

In 2017-2018, Georgio served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach/adjunct professor at Iona College where he supervised all aspects of strength and conditioning for the women's basketball, track and field/cross country, softball, baseball, women's lacrosse, and women's swimming programs. He traveled with the women's basketball team, conducting pregame warm ups, postgame recovery sessions, and nutrition advice and created the Iona Strength and Conditioning Sports Nutrition social media platforms.

Prior to his stay at Iona, Georgio served as a strength and conditioning coach at Mike Boyle Strength and Conditioning, leading athlete groups from youth to professional levels through strength and conditioning programs and preparing athletes for collegiate pro days following MBSC protocol.

Georgio also spent the summer of 2016 at The Citadel as a volunteer strength and conditioning coach, assisting the fulltime staff with the summer strength and conditioning program for football and men's basketball.

A 2016 graduate of Springfield College with a degree in Movement in Sports Studies, Georgio earned a master's degree from Merrimack College in 2017 in Exercise and Sports Studies. He is a National Strength and Conditioning Association Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a USA Weightlifting Level 1 Sports Performance Coach.

Bridget Ward was named assistant athletic trainer at Fordham in September 2019 after working as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Connecticut College the previous two years. She worked directly with the director of sports medicine at Connecticut College, providing injury prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation for the school's 26 varsity sports, working closely with the men's and women's soccer, ice hockey, and lacrosse programs.

Prior to her stint at Connecticut College, Ward served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at St. John's University where she was responsible for assisting with all aspects of the athletic training department.

At St. John's, Ward was directly responsible for overseeing the prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation of athletic injuries for the men's lacrosse, men's and women's fencing, men's and women's soccer spring seasons, and men's and women's tennis teams. Her duties also included supervising and mentoring athletic training students from LIU-Brooklyn.

Prior to her arrival at St. John's, Ward worked as an athletic training intern at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex in Florida. In this position, she most notably assisted in providing primary medical coverage for amateur, semi-professional and professional sporting events hosted by the Disney-owned complex.

A native of Las Vegas, Nevada, Ward received her bachelor's degree in athletic training from the State University of New York at Cortland in 2014 and a master's of professional studies in sport management at St. John's in 2017. At Cortland, she also served as the President of the Athletic Training Club.





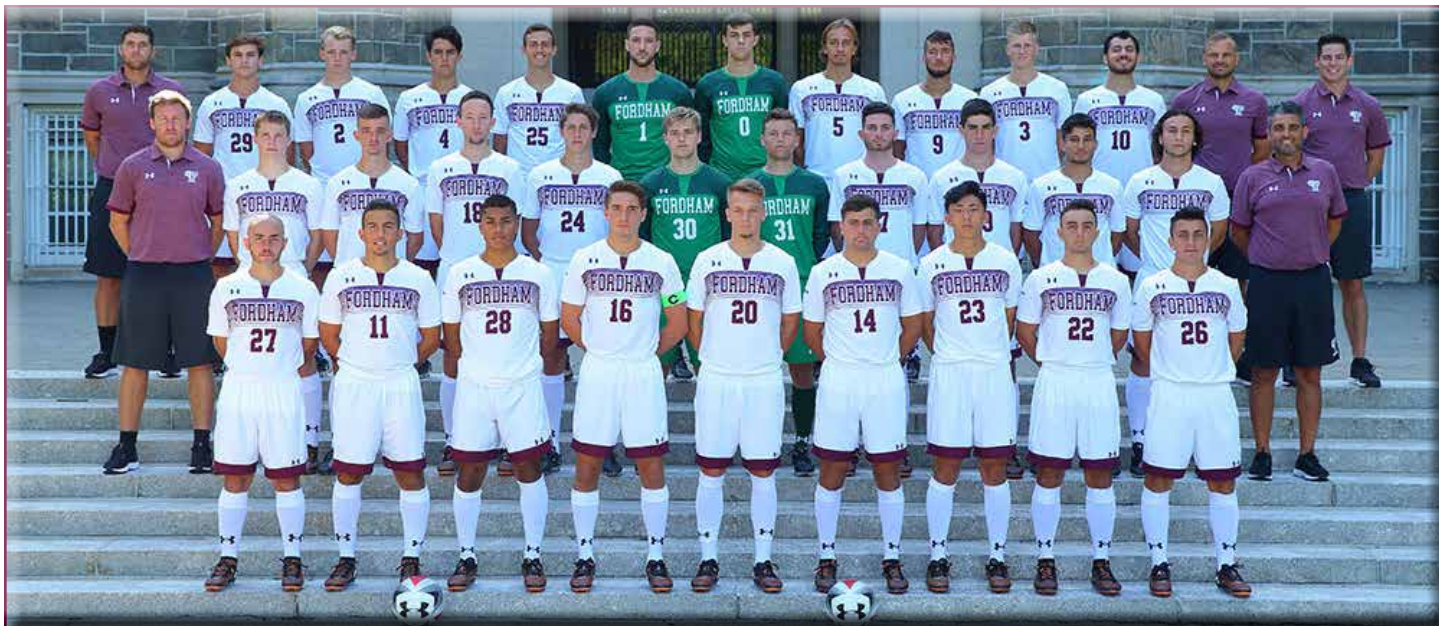

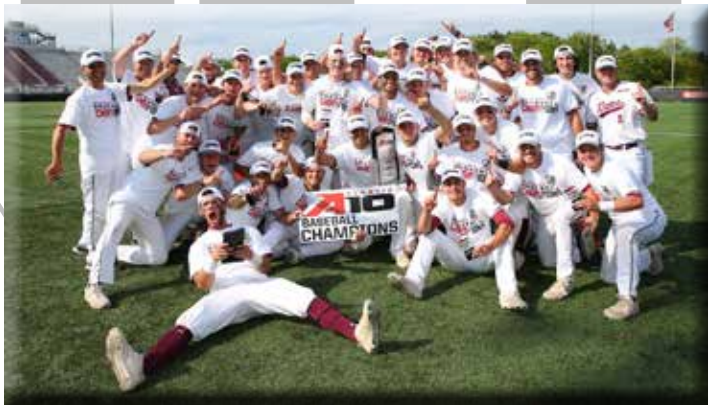

Fordham, the Jesuit University of New York, offers a distinctive, values-centered educational experience rooted in the Jesuit tradition of intellectual rigor and personal attention. Since 1841, Fordham's partner in this great enterprise has been New York. Students enjoy the unparalleled educational, cultural and recreational advantages of living and learning in one of the world's most diverse and dynamic cities.

Engaged Students

The University enrolls more than 15,600 students in its four undergraduate colleges and six graduate and professional schools. With its two distinctive residential campuses—green and gothic Rose Hill, on 85 acres adjacent to the New York Botanical Garden and the Bronx Zoo; and cosmopolitan Lincoln Center, in the heart of Manhattan, across from Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts—Fordham offers students virtually unlimited possibilities for learning and personal growth.

The Rose Hill campus houses Fordham College at Rose Hill, the College of Business Administration, the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, the Graduate School of Religion and Religious Education, and Fordham College of Liberal Studies. The Lincoln Center campus, established in 1961, houses Fordham College at Lincoln Center, the Graduate School of Social Service, the Graduate School of Business Administration, the Graduate School of Education and the School of Law. A third campus, the Marymount Campus of Fordham University in Tarrytown, N.Y., is home to the Westchester divisions of the Graduate School of Business Administration, the Graduate School of Education, the Graduate School of Social Service and Fordham College of Liberal Studies.

Fordham draws students from across the country and around the world who want to live and learn in the global capital of commerce and culture. The University offers one of the most extensive internship programs in the country. Students choose from more than 2,600 internship options in business, communications, education, government, health care, biomedical research, law, the arts and other fields. The Office of Career Services also offers workshops, career days, one-on-one career counseling and on-campus interviews with major corporations. Students compete for and earn prestigious fellowships and scholarships—including Fulbright, Truman, Mellon and other competitive awards. And each year, more than 1,300 students engage in community service, both locally and in distant corners of the world, through the University's award-winning Global Outreach program.

Great Teaching

Fordham has a proud history of approaching education in a distinctly Jesuit way, one that emphasizes *cura personalis*, a commitment to nurturing the whole person—mind, body and spirit—and challenging students to surpass their perceived limitations. This kind of education unites both heart and mind, and at Fordham it occurs within and beyond the classroom.

Fordham's world-class faculty is committed to teaching and research. In small classes (the average class size is 22 and the University boasts a 12:1 student-faculty ratio), these scholars and mentors challenge students to develop to their full potential—and they give each student the individual attention he or she needs to excel.

Students choose from more than 65 majors and academic programs in the liberal and performing arts, sciences, and business. Every student also completes a rich Core Curriculum that spans literature, history, science, religion, philosophy, the social sciences and the arts, and is designed to nurture curiosity and inspire a lifelong love of learning. Special academic offerings include honors programs, study abroad, dual-degree programs with Fordham's graduate schools, and pre-professional programs in law, medicine and

other health professions. Fordham's G.L.O.B.E. international business program combines liberal arts and business courses, and prepares students for multinational careers. Undergraduate students often collaborate with faculty on original research, and they also work with faculty and staff to prepare to compete for Rhodes, Fulbright and other prestigious fellowships and scholarships.

New York Is Our Campus, Fordham Is Our School

New York City provides unparalleled internship and career advantages, but it also offers students a never-ending list of things to see and do—from Broadway theater, museums, and concerts to major league sports or a bike ride through Central Park.

Fordham's two residential campuses—Rose Hill and Lincoln Center—are easily accessible by public and private transportation. The University's Ram Van service also makes it easy for students to enjoy the social and academic life of the two campuses.

Strong orientation programs, special freshman seminars and active faculty advising ensure a smooth transition to college life. Integrated learning communities in the residence halls on the Rose Hill campus give students the chance to collaborate with other students, staff and faculty to design social, service and educational activities and events throughout the year. Students majoring in pre-health professions are mentored by resident upperclassmen in the new Science Integrated Learning Community. The Lincoln Center campus features McMahon Hall, a 20-story complex that provides apartment-style living and great views of Manhattan. Fordham's state-of-the-art facilities also include one of the most technologically advanced libraries in the country.

More than 130 student organizations offer a remarkable range of programming that capitalizes on the cultural resources of New York City. An extensive athletics program includes 22 varsity sports and a range of club and intramural sports. Each year, the Community Service Program gives hundreds of students an opportunity to work together on volunteer projects at dozens of sites in New York City, including soup kitchens, nursing homes, transitional shelters, hospitals and community parks.

A Fordham Degree

While not every student-athlete will win a championship, those who choose Fordham and take advantage of the educational opportunities afforded him or her will get something more important. A Fordham degree.

Founded in 1841 as the first Catholic institution of higher learning in the northeast, Fordham is an independent university in the Jesuit tradition. It grants baccalaureate degrees in the liberal arts and sciences and business administration to both traditional and non-traditional students. Fordham's undergraduate student body both reflects the diversity of the metropolitan area in which the University is located and includes students from other regions who are attracted to New York's cosmopolitan culture. Whether educated at the Rose Hill, Lincoln Center or Tarrytown campus, Fordham students benefit from close contact with a distinguished faculty who teach at the undergraduate, graduate and professional levels.

The Jesuit tradition informs every aspect of a Fordham education. This tradition is characterized by excellence in teaching and by the care and development of each individual student.

Fordham's undergraduate core curriculum is designed to develop the capacity for clear and critical thinking and correct and forceful expression. It seeks to impart a knowledge of scientific principles and skills, an awareness of historical perspective, an understanding of the contemporary world with its cultural diversity, and an intelligent appreciation of religious, philosophical and moral values. Thus, instruction goes beyond the transmission and acquisition of basic knowledge to the exploration of questions of values and ethics. Fordham insists that its students anchor their knowledge and appreciation of the culture, language, history, philosophy and literature of the Western tradition as well as of other peoples by constantly considering the impact of their behavior and decisions on society as a whole.

In the future, as in the past, Fordham will continue to affirm the compatibility of a Catholic, Jesuit identity and respect for diverse religious and philosophical convictions within its educational community. It is in this spirit that Fordham encourages its students to develop an individual commitment to others and explore those themes that are central to the Jesuit tradition: the dignity of the human person, the advancement of the common good and the option for the poor. Of its students, Fordham expects intellectual ability, the desire to engage actively in their own education, a commitment to growth in personal and social values and the willingness to judge and be judged on clear and high standards. Through students' participation in the intellectual community, Fordham teaches them not only how to use the resources of this world, but also how to make their own contribution.

The Jesuit Tradition

Fordham had its beginnings more than 160 years ago, when Archbishop John Hughes founded St. John the Baptist College at Rose Hill, and it has benefited over the years from the services of hundreds of members of the Society of Jesus, a religious order of men, many of whom have devoted their lives to higher education.

Fordham has found that its Catholic and Jesuit origins and traditions continue to provide valuable marks of distinctiveness and a source of strength. As a consequence, these traditions, religious ideas, perspectives and values hold an important place in the University. Students of all faiths and of no faith are given encouragement and opportunity to join in seminars and discussions of religious issues and to participate in religious observances. University staff members are ready to assist students in the quest for their own religious commitment. These opportunities are not imposed on anyone; their use depends on the interest, good will and initiative of the students.

A loving and respectful openness to people of all faiths is an integral part of Fordham's character. The very nature of religious belief requires free, uncoerced consent, just as the nature of a university requires a respect for evidence, investigation, reason, and enlightened assent.

The approach begins with a deep respect for you as an individual and your potential, a principle the Jesuits call *cura personalis*. Because they respect you, our faculty will challenge you to strive for ever greater personal excellence in all aspects of life - intellectual, emotional, moral and physical. That principle, called *magis*, accounts for the rigor of intellectual exchange and the varied challenges you will experience in New York City and the world beyond.

At Fordham, students seek to tap the full potential of mind and heart while leading a life beyond self. Each semester more than 600 Fordham undergraduates follow the Jesuit philosophy of *homines pro aliis*, men and women for others, by contributing their time and talent in service to the community: tutoring the disadvantaged; feeding and clothing the homeless; planning outings for an orphanage; and spending vacation periods in distant corners of the world, from New Mexico to Calcutta, as part of Fordham's Global Outreach Program.

From the Seven Blocks of Granite to the Digger Phelps "Rams." From Frankie Frisch to Olympic gold medalist Tom Courtney to major league pitcher Pete Harnisch. From Mike Marchiano, a 1997 Baseball All-American, to NCAA soccer scoring champion John Wolyniec, to Bobby Kingsbury, the first Atlantic 10 baseball player to earn Player of the Year honors twice, to Jen Mineau, a two-time Softball All-American, and Brienne Ryan, a U.S. Olympic qualifier in swimming, Fordham University Athletics has enjoyed a tremendous amount of success on the local and national playing fields.

Fordham currently sponsors 22 men's and women's varsity sports teams. On the men's side the Rams field teams in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor and outdoor track, soccer, swimming and diving, squash, tennis and water polo, while the women compete in basketball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, soccer, rowing, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, and volleyball.

Last year, marked the 24th season of competition in the Atlantic 10 Conference for the Rams, who were a member of the Patriot League for the previous five years (the Rams are still affiliated with the Patriot League for football). In 24 years as a member of the Atlantic 10, Fordham has come a long way in all sports with women's basketball and baseball each earning their second conference championship, while softball won its eighth Atlantic 10 championship in the last nine seasons in 2019. The Rams now have 16 league titles among softball (eight), men's soccer (three), baseball (two), women's basketball (two), and women's swimming & diving in the Atlantic 10.

Additionally, the football squad won its third Patriot League title in 2014, joining the 2002 and 2007 team, and have reached the NCAA playoffs five times (2002, 2007, 2013, 2014, and 2015). In rowing, the women's lightweight four has medaled multiple times at the IRA National Rowing Championships (2008, 2012, and 2013) with the women's freshmen four winning the gold medal at the 2012 Dad Vail Regatta and the women's club 4 taking gold at the 2014 Head of the Charles. Also, men's cross country team won back-to-back IC4A championship in 2013 and 2014, with the golf team winning the 2009 ECAC Championship and the water polo team capturing a share of the 2009 CWPA Northern Division regular season title. In addition, the squash team won the Chaffee Cup at the CSA Team Championship in 2019.

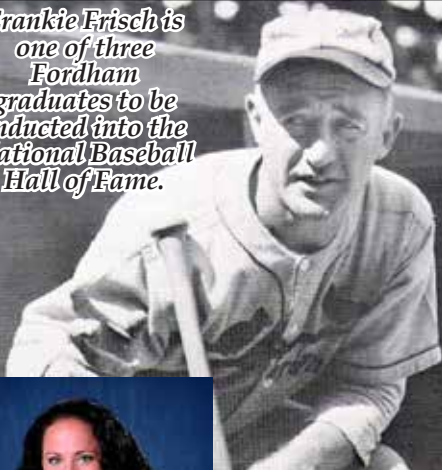

Athletic Success

Success for the Fordham student-athlete is not only found on the fields and courts. It's also seen in the classroom. Last year, 325 student-athletes were named to the Atlantic 10 Commissioner's Honor Roll, which led all Atlantic 10 schools, for having a 3.0 GPA or better for the semester and 35 more were named to the Patriot League Honor Roll for football, while 11 water polo players received ACWPC All-Academic honors.

On the national level, Fordham had a CoSIDA Academic All-America® honoree in five of the last six years, the last being women's swimming's Nele Albers in 2018. This success is nothing new to Fordham as the Rams have had 33 student-athletes earn Academic All-America® honors since 1968. The Rams did have four Academic All-District selections for 2018-19 with football's Bryce Petty, women's soccer's Clara Gastaldi, men's swimming's Christopher Sleutjes, and baseball's Billy Godrick..

Locally, the Rams had 17 student-athletes named to their respective Atlantic 10 or Patriot League All-Academic teams. Additionally, the men's and women's swimming and diving programs were named CSCAA Scholar All-America, while the men's and women's cross country and track & field teams were honored as USTFCCCA All-Academic Teams. The men's and women's soccer teams both received the United Soccer Coaches Team Academic Award with the women's tennis team earning the ITA All-Academic Award, the baseball team receiving the ABCA Team Academic Excellence Award, and water polo garnering the ACWPC All-Academic Team Award.

In the spring of 2019, eight Fordham teams were publicly recognized by the NCAA for posting multi-year APR scores in the top ten percent of all squads for their respective sport. The Rams were third among Atlantic 10 institutions for the number of teams honored.

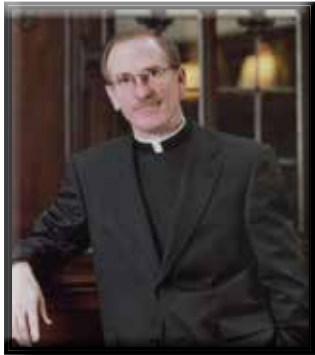

Joseph M. McShane, S.J. **University President**

The Reverend Joseph M. McShane, S.J., became the 32nd president of Fordham University on July 1, 2003. His appointment as president marked his return to the University, where he had previously served as Dean of Fordham College, a professor of theology and a member of the Board of Trustees.

A native of New York City, Father McShane entered the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) in 1967 and was ordained a priest in 1977. He received a Bachelor's degree in English and philosophy and a master's degree in English from Boston College, and he holds a Ph.D. in the history of Christianity from the University of Chicago. He earned M.Div. and S.T.M. degrees from the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley.

He has served on the religious studies faculty at LeMoyne College in Syracuse, N.Y., from 1982 to 1992, and as chair of LeMoyne's Department of Religious Studies from 1991 to 1992. Father McShane joined the Fordham University Board of Trustees in 1987 and served until 1992, when he was appointed Dean of Fordham College and professor of theology. In 1998, Father McShane left Fordham to become president of the University of Scranton in Pennsylvania. He was reappointed to Fordham's Board of Trustees in 2001. In 2003, he left the University of Scranton to return to Fordham.

Father McShane has served on the boards of Fordham University, the Metropolitan Transportation Authority Financing Commission, the "Preserving the Vision" Blue Ribbon Committee for the Diocese of Brooklyn, Loyola University of New Orleans, the University of Scranton, St. Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia, Fordham Preparatory School, Canisius High School, Scranton Preparatory School, Regis High School and the American Council on Education. He presently serves on the boards of Santa Clara University, the Commission of Independent Colleges and Universities, Canisius College and the Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Jeffrey Gray **Vice President for Student Affairs**

Jeffrey L. Gray was appointed Vice President for Student Affairs at Fordham University on July 1, 1996. He began at Fordham as the Assistant Dean of Students for Residential Life in September 1989, and was named Dean of Student Life in August 1990. In June, 1997, Gray assumed the additional responsibility of advancing the University's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and Recreation.

As the chief student affairs officer for Fordham University, Gray oversees all student affairs functions at the Rose Hill and Lincoln Center campuses of the University, including the Offices of the Deans of Students, the Dean of Student Services, Residential Life, the University Judicial Process, Hospitality and Dining Services, Counseling and Psychological Services, Student Health Services, Career Services, the Offices of Student Leadership and Community Development, Intercampus Transportation, the McGinley Student Center, New Student Orientation, Disability Services, the Alcohol and Drug Education Programs and Intercollegiate Athletics and Recreation.

Under Gray's direction and leadership, several programmatic enhancements have been advanced in support of intercollegiate athletics including multiple capital renewal projects, expanded athletic scholarship initiatives and the addition of several key personnel in the administrative and coaching ranks. At the 2001 Block F Awards Dinner, Gray received the Jack Coffey award, presented annually to a Fordham administrator, alumnus or coach for outstanding contributions and dedication to the athletic program.

As a senior member of the President's Administrative Cabinet, Mr. Gray plays a significant role in the advancement of the University's Strategic Planning process, which has included the advancement of strategic initiatives for student affairs and intercollegiate athletics in support of the University's mission, vision and strategic planning objectives.

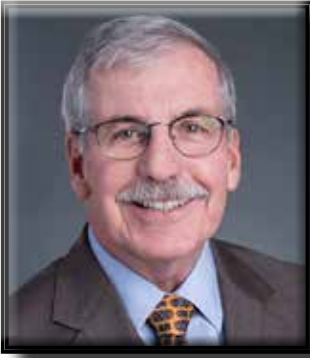
Gray received a bachelor of arts in psychology from the State University of New York at Plattsburgh, a master of science in counseling and guidance from Syracuse University and a master of science in administration from Western Connecticut State University. He was director of counseling and guidance for the McGraw Central School System from September 1981 to August 1984, Assistant to the Director of Housing at Western Connecticut State University from September 1984 to December 1987 and the Assistant Director of Residential Life at Montclair State College in New Jersey from 1987 until September 1989.

Gray and his wife, Peggy, have four children, Katelynn, a 2010 Fordham graduate and a member of the 2010 Atlantic 10 Champion women's swimming & diving team, Brendan, Megan (a 2016 Fordham graduate) and Erin (a 2018 Fordham graduate), and they reside in Stamford, Connecticut.



David Roach

Director of Intercollegiate Athletics



David T. Roach, who was named the director of intercollegiate athletics and recreation at Fordham in October of 2012, begins his eighth season with the Rams in 2018-2019. Roach, who served as the president of the National Association of Collegiate Athletic Directors in 2010-2011, brought 22 years of experience as an athletic director to Fordham.

Roach has put his mark on the Fordham athletic programs, both on and off the fields of competition. On the playing fields, Roach has overseen the resurfacing of the Murphy Field athletic complex along with Jack Coffey Field and the installation of new chair back seating to the grandstand. In the Rose Hill Gym, a new floor is being installed in 2019 while new seating was installed in the summer of 2017 and two large video scoreboards were added in 2013, allowing high-definition in-game video. In the Lombardi Memorial Center, the women's basketball team received new offices and the playing surface of the fieldhouse was replaced.

The Rams have enjoyed on-field success in Roach's first seven years with 12 Atlantic 10 titles along with one Patriot League championship. Over that time, the Rams have made 16 NCAA appearances and four WNIT bids for women's basketball. Fordham sent three teams to the NCAA Championships in 2013-14 for the first time in school history (football, women's basketball and softball) and followed that with three more in 2014-2015 (football, men's soccer and softball) and again had three teams advance in 2019 (women's basketball, softball and baseball).

Over the past four years, Fordham recorded consecutive seasons with an overall winning record, including a .601 winning percentage in 2016-2017, the highest for the Rams in recent history.

Off the playing fields, Roach teamed with the Janssen Sports Leadership Center to establish the Fordham Leadership Academy for Fordham student-athletes, which aims to cultivate, test and aid the school's student-athletes and coaches as they work towards becoming world-class leaders in athletics, academics and life.

Roach has also been instrumental in athletic marketing initiatives, signing a consulting and sales partnership with Learfield to handle all commercial rights for Fordham as well as partnering with Barnes and Noble to serve as the official online e-commerce vendor for Fordham Athletics.

Roach arrived at Fordham after spending the previous eight years as the director of athletics at Colgate University, where he managed the university's programs in physical education, recreation, and competitive athletics for 25 Division I men's and women's teams, as well as intramural and club sports.

During his eight-year tenure at Colgate, where Roach earned UnderArmor Athletic Director of the Year honors in 2009-2010, the Raiders placed 14 teams in NCAA tournaments and captured 17 Patriot League titles or ECAC championships. Colgate student-athletes earned 18 All-American honors and 34 students were named Academic All-American scholars. In 2010-11, Colgate was No. 1 in NCAA Division I with its 100 percent graduation rate.

While at Colgate, Roach coordinated the development of a new athletic brand and mascot; enhanced Colgate's scoreboards and overall look of its athletic venues; started the Raider Academic Honor Roll honoring student-athletes for academic accomplishments; increased ticket sales for football, hockey, basketball, and lacrosse; increased revenue from corporate sponsorships from \$18,000 to more than \$200,000 per year; and signed an agreement with Time Warner Cable Sports to televise selected athletic events.

Roach has also been very active in shaping the landscape of intercollegiate athletics, being appointed to a four-year term on the NCAA's Playing Rules Oversight Panel beginning in September of 2017 and serving on the Atlantic 10 Finance Committee. He has been a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) board since 2006, serving as president in 2010-2011 and, prior to that, was a member of the NACDA Executive Committee as an officer from 2006-2010. Roach was appointed to the NACDA/USOC committee which strives to enhance the relationship between the USOC and intercollegiate athletics and serves on the Board of Directors for the U.S. International University Sports Federation (US-IUSF), a governing body for the U.S in all FISU events, such as the World University Games and the World University Championships.

In the past, Roach served on the NCAA Diversity Leadership Strategic Planning Committee, the NCAA Management Council, the NCAA Championships and Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee, the NCAA FCS Football Championship Committee, the joint NCAA OSL Sub Committee with the U.S. Olympic Committee and the National Governing Bodies and as chair of both the NCAA Swimming and Diving Committee and the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee.

Prior to Colgate, Roach served as the Director of Athletics at Brown University for 14 years. In 2002, Brown's athletics program was honored by U.S. News & World Report as one of the top 20 athletics programs in the nation.

Under his tutelage, Brown won seven national championships and 58 Ivy League/Eastern titles with the Bears appearing in 34 NCAA championships. Seven Brown student-athletes received NCAA or NACDA Post Graduate Scholarships.

Roach created the school's first Student Athlete Advisory Board at Brown and implemented new sports marketing/promotions programs, including a new athletic logo and corporate sponsorship program. He helped increase endowment for athletics from \$10 million to \$45 million and oversaw \$16 million in capital improvements.

At both schools, Roach instituted a program where each varsity team adopted a local school. The student-athletes mentor the students at the school, helping guide them academically and help the classroom teacher achieve the set goals for the school year.

Prior to his time as an athletic director, Roach served as the head swimming coach at the University of Tennessee from 1986-1990 and at Brown from 1978-1986. At Tennessee, he was named SEC Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1989, coached 26 All-Americans and had a 23-13-1 dual meet record. He helped improve the Volunteers' national recognition by moving the program from 39th to fourth at the NCAA Division I Championship.

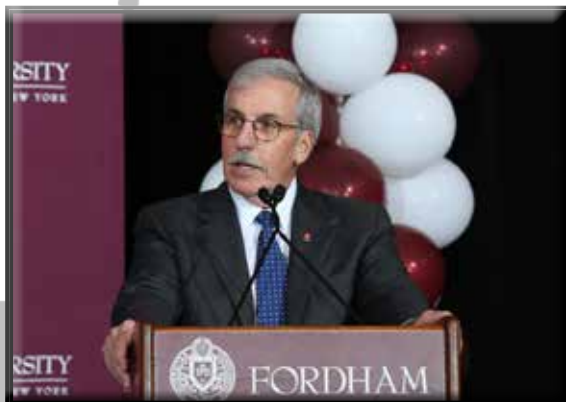
As the head coach at Brown, Roach guided the Bruins to a 74-6-1 dual meet record, three Ivy League team championships and two Eastern team titles.

Roach was inducted into the Rhode Island Aquatic Hall of Fame in 1988, the Brown University Hall of Fame in 1989 and received a Springfield College Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2018. In 1985, he was appointed as assistant coach of the United States National Swimming Team which competed at the World University Games in Kobe, Japan.

A native of Waterbury, Conn., Roach received his bachelor's degree from Springfield College in 1971, and earned a master of science degree in physical education from the school in 1972. He was a member of the Springfield College men's varsity swimming team that won three consecutive New England Conference championships, serving as the team's co-captain in 1971.

After receiving his master's degree in 1972, Roach served in the United States Marine Corps from 1972-75 attaining the rank of Captain.

Roach and his wife, Anne, have three daughters, Elizabeth, Michelle and Alexandra.





Charlie Elwood

Deputy Director of Intercollegiate Athletics

Charlie Elwood, former Senior Associate Athletic Director at St. John’s University, is in his 19th year at Fordham University, his eighth as the Deputy Director of Athletics. He served the previous eleven years as the Director of Athletic Administration, being named to the post in July of 2001.

Elwood oversees the comprehensive day-to-day internal operations of the Athletic Department. These responsibilities include fiscal management, facility and event management, scheduling, personnel administration, compliance, assisting in the strategic planning process for the department, sports information and the intramural, recreation and club sport programs.

A member of the NCAA Division I men’s soccer committee from 2006-2010, Elwood served as the Chairman of the committee from 2008-09. On the conference scene, Elwood served two three-year stints on the Atlantic 10 men’s soccer championships committee, serving as chair of the committee in 2005-06 and 2008-09. For the past five years, Elwood has been the co-chair of the committee.

Elwood was promoted to Senior Associate Athletic Director at St. John’s in December 2000 after serving as Associate Athletic Director/External Affairs since July of 1997. He joined the University in February 1996, after eight years in the Department of Athletics at the College of William & Mary.

At St. John’s he was responsible for overseeing the areas of marketing, advertising, fundraising, ticketing, sports information, business office and the equipment room for St. John’s 21 intercollegiate sports. He served as the liaison with Madison Square Garden for scheduling and game operations and was the scheduling administrator for Men’s Basketball. He was also the Director of Licensing for the University.

Elwood served as the Tournament Manager of the NCAA Division I Men’s Basketball Tournament First/Second Rounds at Nassau Coliseum in March 2001, hosted by St. John’s. In that capacity, Elwood managed all operations of the NCAA Championships, from travel and lodging for competing teams to media and game operations as well as fiscal responsibility for the tournament.

Elwood had been a member of the BIG EAST men’s soccer committee since 1997 and served as its chair through the 2000-01 academic year.

He joined the University in 1996 as Associate Athletic Director/Athletic Business Affairs. In that position, he oversaw all elements of the business office, ticket office, facilities, game operations and the equipment room.

Prior to his arrival at St. John’s, Elwood served as Assistant Athletic Director of Business Affairs at the College of William & Mary from November 1988 to February 1996. He was responsible for supervising financial operations of the business department and ticket operations.

A graduate of Fordham University, Elwood began his career in Chicago in 1982 at DePaul, when he was hired to work as Director of Business Affairs. He worked there for six years (1982-88), before leaving to take the position at William & Mary. He received his master of science in sports administration from Biscayne (Fla.) College in 1981 and his MBA in marketing from DePaul University in 1986.

Charlie and his wife, Carolyn, are the proud parents of two daughters, Blake, a 2019 Fordham graduate who was a member of the track and field team, and Kylie, a junior at Fordham and a member of the Fordham crew.

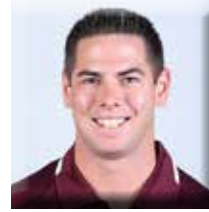

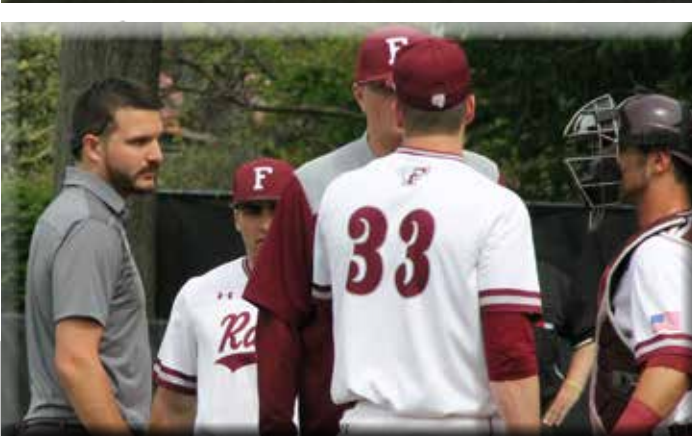

Jack Coffey Field

Fordham University's Jack Coffey Field took on a new look for the 2005 season as the playing surface was replaced with FieldTurf™, one of the top artificial surfaces in the world. This project was part of a three-prong effort to improve all athletic fields at Fordham.

The first step to the project was the resurfacing of the Murphy Field Complex which was completed in the summer of 2004. This facility serves as the home to the Fordham varsity softball team (Bahoshy Softball Field) as well as the practice facility for the football Rams and hosted the 2005, 2009, 2014, and 2018 Atlantic 10 Softball Championship Tournaments. Murphy Field is also highly utilized by Fordham's intramural, club sports and recreational programs.

The second prong is the Jack Coffey Field project which commenced on November 29th with the removal of the existing natural grass surface. Before the new playing surface was installed, a new drainage system was put in place.

The new fields feature FieldTurf™ for both the football and baseball fields along with new lights, a new scoreboard, new baseball dugouts and a new grandstand for baseball. In addition to hosting the football and baseball Rams, the newly surfaced Jack Coffey Field will also host the men's and women's soccer teams and be available for the intramural and club sports programs.

The third prong of the field renovation project was the resurfacing of the Fordham Prep field. This field also received a

FieldTurf™ playing surface along with lights and a synthetic running track. The field will be utilized by Fordham Prep during the day and will be available to Fordham University intramural, club sports and recreational programs at night.

FieldTurf™ is a privately held company that holds worldwide patents on its products and methods of installation. It is currently used by a host of National Football League teams, including the New York Jets and Giants at the New Jersey Meadowlands, as well as by numerous collegiate teams, including the University of Nebraska, the University of Washington and the University of Oregon.

In 2012, a new state-of-the-art, full color, video scoreboard from Daktronics was installed. The new scorebaord allows for live video to be played, along with the ability to pull live statistics.

In summer 2014, the entire playing surface of Jack Coffey Field was re-done with FieldTurf™, while individual chairback seating was added to sections 6-10 of the grandstand, as well as a new public address sound system.

Since its original renovation, the complex has hosted two NCAA FCS Playoff games (2013 and 2014), an NCAA Men's Soccer Championship opening round game (2017), one Atlantic 10 men's soccer championship (2019) and four Atlantic 10 baseball championship tournaments (2006, 2012, 2016, and 2019).
